Chair Jyl DeJong called the meeting to order at 4:02 pm with the following members present:

Denise Emal representing the Treasurer's Office
Calvin Bandstra representing the Auditor's Office
Kevin Kincaid representing the Sheriff's Office
Jyl DeJong representing the Recorder's office
Joe Mrstik representing the County Attorney's office
Bill Shepherd and Lyle Vander Meiden representing the Board of Supervisors

Each member introduced themselves and stated his/her position on increases for the represented office.

Kevin Kincaid reported he must use the Back the Blue law to make his recommendation. He averaged the salaries from the same comparisons as last year, Police Chiefs of the cities of Bettendorf, Marshalltown, and Mason City. Kevin is asking for a \$22,000 increase, for the Sheriff's salary.

Joe Mrstik reported he compared positions of County Attorney's in the State of Iowa that were similar in size of Marion County and similar years of service as a lawyer. He recommends a \$11,000 increase for the County Attorney's salary.

Calvin Bandstra reported he reviewed other county department head's salaries, positions at local government (City of Pella, City of Knoxville, City of Pleasantville, Knoxville Schools, and Pella Schools), state government, and private business comparables from IWD. He recommends a salary between \$100,000 and \$105,000 for the Auditor's salary.

Denise Emal reported she looked at the ISAC salary survey, state, and federal salaries for similar positions. Denise recommends a salary of \$105,000 for the Treasurer's salary.

Lyle Vander Meiden reported on the job market within our County which includes reduction in hours and layoffs. Bill Shepherd reported he appreciates all elected officials, and they are all good people. Bill would like to see a 3% increase and could lean higher. Lyle and Bill recommend a salary of \$48,000 for the Board of Supervisor members.

Jyl DeJong reported she looked at passport agents, paralegals, and records management positions. Jyl also looked at Benton County, Sioux County, and Washington County. Jyl recommends a salary of \$103,000 for the Recorder's salary.

Discussion followed regarding the recommendations and the duty of the compensation board members.

Motion by Kevin and second by Joe to recommend the following salaries for the elected officials. (See below) The vote was unanimous, and the motion carried 7-0.

Motion by Bill and second by Denise to leave the stipend for the Chair of the Board of Supervisors at \$125 per month or \$1500 per year. The vote was unanimous, and the motion carried 7-0.

Motion by Bill and second by Jyl to adjourn. The vote was unanimous, and the motion carried 7-0. The meeting was adjourned at 4:47 pm.

5. Public Hearing: - 168th Place Bridge Replacement Project

NOTICE OF PUBLIC HEARING FOR A SECONDARY ROAD IMPROVEMENT PROJECT

The Marion County Board of Supervisors will hold a public hearing during a regular board meeting. The meeting will be in the board meeting room at 3014 East Main St, Knoxville, Iowa at 9:00 A.M., on January 28, 2025. The purpose of the public hearing is to obtain public comments on preliminary design and potential land acquisition for the following proposed secondary road improvement project.

168th Place Bridge Replacement over North Cedar Creek

This project is located approximately 1.2 miles north of the Marion/Monroe County line. The project will include the removal of the existing 100 feet span by 20 feet wide bridge and construct a new 150 feet span by 24 feet wide bridge meeting the current standards. Work to regrade the existing roadway for approximately 800 feet will be included with the project. The elevation of the new roadway will be approximately 3 feet above the existing roadway elevation. Some additional Right-Of-Way will be necessary to complete this project. The additional Right-Of-Way would be a small strip acquisition along the west side of the roadway to accommodate the new roadway embankment.

You are invited to attend this public hearing to express your views concerning the proposed secondary road project or you may submit your written comments to the Marion County Auditor no later than 4:00 p.m., January 24, 2025.

WHEREAS, the DOT will maintain the detour and provide appropriate traffic control devices;

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Supervisors appoint the County Engineer as the Authorized representative to execute and sign the conditions report, perform a joint inspection, and execute and sign Form 810012wd associated with each of the detour pertinent to the IA 5 and IA 14 closures.

AGREEMENT FOR DOT-INITIATED DETOUR OF PRIMARY HIGHWAYS ONTO LOCAL ROADS

This Agreement is entered into by and between the Iowa Department of Transportation, hereinafter known as the Department; and the Marion County, hereinafter known as the Local Public Agency (LPA).

WHEREAS, the Department has determined the necessity to temporarily close primary Highway IA 14 from Co. Rd. G40 to Co. Rd. G28 for the purpose of construction, reconstruction, maintenance, natural disasters, or other emergencies; and

WHEREAS, It is necessary to provide a detour for the primary highway closure period; and

WHEREAS, the LPA agrees to permit the use of its roads as a detour, more particularly described as follows:

Along Co. Rd. T17 from IA 163 Exit 42 to IA 92

_____ ; and

WHEREAS, Authorized representatives of both the Department and the LPA shall jointly execute and sign a written report concerning the condition of the proposed detour, after jointly inspecting said road, the subject of the proposed detour; said report to be in sufficient detail as to reasonably reflect the condition of the roadway base, surface, shoulders and bridges; and

WHEREAS, the Department will review, and inspect when necessary, the bridges on the detour route and determine the maximum vehicle weight (up to 156,000 pounds) that can be safely carried on these bridges and submit this information to the LPA for its review. The LPA may choose to restrict detour traffic to only vehicles of legal weight or size. If the LPA allows oversize or overweight loads, it shall notify the Department in writing. The Department shall approve the routing of overweight vehicles on the detour route, up to the limits specified by the LPA; and

WHEREAS, the Department agrees to perform the following pre-detour maintenance, if any: Installation of temporary traffic control Detour signs for IA14, and Pavement Markings; and

WHEREAS, the Department agrees to maintain the detour and provide all traffic control devices required by the Manual of Uniform Traffic Control Devices (MUTCD), as adopted by the Department pursuant to 761 IAC 130, including the marking of no-passing zones during the period the local agency road(s) and structure(s) are being utilized as a primary road detour; and

WHEREAS, Prior to revocation of the detour, the Department shall restore the local agency road to as nearly as possible as good condition as it was prior to its designation as a temporary primary road, or adequately compensate the local agency for excessive traffic upon the local agency road during the period it was used as a temporary primary road, in accordance with Section 313.28 or Section 313.29 of the Iowa Code and Iowa DOT Policy 600.05; and

WHEREAS, The detour period is estimated to begin March 15th 2025 and end Nov. 30th 2025; and

WHEREAS, the parties agree to the following additional provisions, if any: _____

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT AGREED that the described road be used as a detour under stipulations outlined above.

WHEREAS, the LPA agrees to permit the use of its roads as a detour, more particularly described as follows:

Along Co. Rd. T17 from IA 5 to IA 92

WHEREAS, Authorized representatives of both the Department and the LPA shall jointly execute and sign a written report concerning the condition of the proposed detour, after jointly inspecting said road, the subject of the proposed detour; said report to be in sufficient detail as to reasonably reflect the condition of the roadway base, surface, shoulders and bridges; and

WHEREAS, the Department will review, and inspect when necessary, the bridges on the detour route and determine the maximum vehicle weight (up to 156,000 pounds) that can be safely carried on these bridges and submit this information to the LPA for its review. WHEREAS, Prior to revocation of the detour, the Department shall restore the local agency road to as nearly as possible as good condition as it was prior to its designation as a temporary primary road, or adequately compensate the local agency for excessive traffic upon the local agency road during the period it was used as a temporary primary road, in accordance with Section 313.28 or Section 313.29 of the Iowa Code and Iowa DOT Policy 600.05; and

WHEREAS, The detour period is estimated to begin March 15th 2025 and end Nov. 15th 2025; and

WHEREAS, the parties agree to the following additional provisions, if any: Project is to last approx. 100 days

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT AGREED that the described road be used as a detour under stipulations outlined above.
